Festival will highlight teens' films

Are you a high school or college student who has an eye for film? Maybe vou've made a short movie with friends and you want to see how it stacks up against other student films?

You can submit it to the International Student Film Festival Hollywood Film and Video Competition, which will be held Nov. 14-18 in the NoHo Arts District in North Hollywood.

The other students on the "Rumors" film team were Leeron Peretz, Fenny Canon, Lena Press, Shanshan Liang, Rosa Gasparian and Sean Real.

Smith, who lives in Sherman Oaks, will be a senior at Grant in the fall. He's already been accepted to the Brooks Institute of Photography in Ventura and plans

to pursue a filmmaking career. Another Grant High student, Brittany Marmo of Van Nuvs, led a

team that's submitting a film in

the ISFFH competition this year. Titled "Now I See," the film is about a blind girl who is taunted by a bully. When the bully's friends desert her because of the way she treats the blind girl, the bully discovers what it's like to be an outsider - just like the blind

Marmo, who will be a sophomore in the fall, was only a freshman when she led the team, made up of Khate Tagle, Sangeeta Prabhakar and Noelle Bauer, in mak-
